## Monday 16th September 2019 Meeting report

## President Bill: announcements

The President referred to the event held by the Epsom Rotary Club about two weeks ago where Phil Goff and John Tamihere attended to present their positions for the upcoming mayoral election. The present District Governor apparently felt the need to remind clubs about the apolitical nature of the Rotary Organisation. There has been some criticism in social media about this. In the writer's opinion this demonstrates a lack of common sense about these matters.

The President confirmed that he and Bruce Passau had interviewed four applicants for the Summer Science School in January 2020. Two candidates from Onehunga High School have been chosen for nomination. The cost of sending the students, if successful, is \$1,500 each which has been fully funded by the generosity of several members of the club.

## One Minute Spot

<u>Ian Devereux</u> has been doing some research into polio eradication. The polio worldwide initiative in Nigeria ran into some initial difficulty because of the influence of native witchdoctors. They claimed that any male who took the vaccine would become sterile. However, that has been overcome. Ian has been trying to track down a number for those people on a worldwide basis who are currently suffering from polio. He thinks the number is 69. He expressed the view that everyone in the room could see the end of polio in the world during their lifetimes. He encouraged us to continue our support for the Rotary International programme and he will be adding his support as well.

## One Minute Spot cont:

Bede Brittenden advised that our district 9910 is joining with a neighbouring district 9920 on 1 November 2019 to "Ride the Trains". The idea is that Rotarians with collecting buckets will be on the trains that day. This is an idea which has been tried out successfully in Australia. Bede got an indication from the members that they supported the programme and will be reminding us about volunteers for this closer to the time.

### **Five-minute speaker**

Alistair Grundy spoke about kauri gum. He described it as fossilized resin from kauri trees hardened when exposed to the air. Before the arrival of Europeans, the Maoris used a softer version as chewing gum. It was also used as a fire starter, and when burnt and mixed with animal fat, for tattooing, With the arrival of Europeans the gum became sought after because it was in demand for use in varnishes and resins, marine glues and locally in the manufacture of linoleum. By the end of the 19<sup>th</sup> century it was the main export from Auckland to the rest of the world.

The gum diggers worked in swampy areas of the northern part of the North Island, particularly in Northland. They used wooden spears, sometimes 8 metres in length, to try and locate the gum buried in the swamps. It was hard work and they sold their products to buyers from Auckland who then exported it overseas. The industry came to an end in the 1930s.

## Guest speaker – Dennis Oliver on glaucoma

Dennis Oliver has been an optometrist practising in The Mall in Onehunga for about 40 years. He makes presentations on behalf of Glaucoma NZ, which is a charity set up to:

Inform people and support people with glaucoma;

Provide professional education about what it is:

Sponsor and encourage research:

Broadcast its information and expertise via a website, emails and publications, and also to maintain an 0800 support line. The website address is info@glaucoma.org.nz and the help line is 0800 452 286.

Dennis had brought with him a volume of material comprising newsletters and articles. He explained that glaucoma is the leading cause of preventable blindness in New Zealand. It is a silent disease with no symptoms. Half of those suffering from it don't know they have it. If it can be detected early, then treatment can prevent progression and preserve sight. The damage to the optic nerve which

is caused by glaucoma is irreversible. The message from Dennis is to have your eyes examined on a regular basis.

Dennis said that research into events that people fear shows that blindness is ahead of anything else. It is a condition that can be determined by examination. There are many types and it can occur at any age.

Most treatments are to prevent a build-up of liquid in the eye which increases pressure on the optic nerve. This is done by discouraging the manufacture of fluids by the body in the eye area or by improving the drainage of fluids from the eye. Some of this work needs to be carried out by surgery but other treatments involve the use of various eye drops and ointments.

The cause of glaucoma is not known but Dennis predicted that it is likely that in the future there will be more information available from genetic studies and there will certainly be new medications and laser techniques.
