<u>Five-minute speaker</u>, Parehuia Enari talked about the PASS journey so far. She said that she and Fatu have had an incredible journey over the past five years. The school has a beautiful relationship with Rotary, especially though the Reading Enrichment Programme (REP).

Until five years ago, Fatu and Parehuia would come home from teaching in Gisborne each day and put the nets out, in a spot facing Young Nick's Head, to fish for their dinner. They would pray about setting up a school, because they wanted to make a difference for the young men in their community, who were not achieving anywhere near as well as they should. Their dream was to set up an outdoor education school for Maori boys, but this dream was not being realised. The couple had two offers to set up schools for Maori boys,



but neither opportunity was in Gisborne and Fatu wanted to keep on fishing! (Parehuia and Fatu thought they had had enough of the city lifestyle).

Then ... Sir Michael Jones called. Sir Michael is a very determined and strategic man. Five years later, and PASS is five years old. Sir Michael's vision for Maori boys was exactly the same as the vision that Parehuia and Fatu had, except that they planned to set this up in Gisborne. Prior to meeting Sir Michael to hear from him about his plan, (that they intended to reject), Parehuia and Fatu had noted seven ridiculous things that they thought would never happen, ensuring in their minds that their life in Gisborne was safe. But Michael covered off every one of the seven ridiculous ideas. He began by stating that Parehuia would be called Mum and Fatu would be called Dad, and they would be coprincipals. Two of the seven! This was the beginning of an amazing journey together.

Then Minister of Education Hekla Parata opened PASS with 17 students, (who appeared to be 25 $\stackrel{\circ}{\circ}$, with the plumbing still being installed.)

PASS now has a roll of 114 and it is growing. The vision was to find 13 and 14 year olds who had become disenfranchised from school, bring them back into the education system and ensure they were able to access NCEA.

The first few years were tough. Parehuia and Fatu were pioneering a new way and did not have models to follow. This year, for the first time in five years, PASS has exceeded targets in terms of added value. These are exciting times!

Volunteers came to PASS in 2018, and REP began. The confidence that students have gained, and the relationships between students and volunteers/mentors is invaluable. For many of the students, it is the first time they have been close to a European man or woman. It enriches students' lives and it also enriches volunteers' lives.

Parehuia read a letter from a PASS student to Barry. Barry supports this young man at school and attends his sports games.

Dear Uncle Barry, it is me Papauta. You know me as just Papa.

I am so sorry to hear all the pain that you have suffered.

And that your accident I heard was so bad, I wish it was only a dream you had. Me and Devon ask about you every day, we also get together and pray.

We ask God please heal this kind caring man who spends his time with us when he can.

He has helped us in lots of ways, not just reading but talks with us and listens and makes things okay. So dear God, please take uncle Barry's pain away, heal his broken bones and make him strong like he was the other day.

This is my prayer for him right now and I promise I will stop being a little cow.

(PS. Barry is now likely to be sent home from Hospital, this Friday 29th November.

<u>Duncan McDonald</u> spoke positively and passionately about his experience with REP and the value of this volunteering opportunity. He finished with, "What you do speaks so loudly; I cannot hear what you say". He encouraged us all to get involved in REP.

President Bill provided the thought for the week from Proverbs "be an encourager, for your tongue holds the power of life and death."
