# **Guest speaker Professor David Gerrard** spoke about

DRUGS in Sport: Chasing the CHEATS

Dave offered his insights through involvement in half a century of Olympic sport: reflections of an athlete, Chef de Mission and academic physician. He spoke of sport and national pride.



Sport in society ... includes kudos, financial gain, power.

are the cheats ahead of the game? **Questions:** 

why worry?

Answers: include an anti-doping philosophy, and considerations around ethics, health and the law.

Seminal events include changes to the sports doping landscape.

#### Historical snapshots include:

- In the 1904 Olympics, marathon runner Thomas Hicks used a mixture of brandy and strychnine and nearly succumbed.
- In 1960 in Rome, Knud Jensen died in the team trial after using amphetamines.
- In the 1967 Tour de France, Tommy Simpson died on Mont Ventoux, due to amphetamines and brandy.
- In East Germany in the 1960s-80s drug misuse was on a national scale in both track and field, and swimming. At the time, it was thought that the superior performance of the German athletes was due to medical advances - in fact it was a clandestine, state sanctioned programme of drug abuse, involving mostly female athletes – the use of masculinising hormones, taken under medical supervision was documented in the Stasi reports. In Montreal in 1976 - Germany won 11 of 15 gold medals. When contested about the deep voices of the female swimmers, the East German coach said, "We've come here to swim, not to sing."
- A current dilemma exists with male-female transgender athletes in terms of fairness versus inclusivity. This is a highly contentious area.
- At the 1988 Olympics in Seoul, Ben Johnson because the first athlete to be banned. Clive James said, "they found traces of urine in his anabolic steroids".
- Marion Jones won 5 Olympic medals in 2000, she had become involved in the underground use of the steroid THG. In 2007, she was jailed for perjury. Marion was the 1st Olympian to be disqualified retrospectively.



- Nadzeya Ostapchuk in London 2012 had stanozolol in her system. She won gold, Dame Valerie Adams came second ... and got her gold medal 6 months later in Auckland, which is not the same as receiving it in London.
- Michelle Smith in Atlanta in 1996 was swimming for Ireland.
   She won 3 gold and 1 bronze medal in 1 week. Michelle did not return a positive test at the time. However, in 1998, in an out of competition test she



returned adulterated urine. There was a small sample bottle of whisky in the urine, the lab test declared the sample to be "inconsistent with life". The case was taken to the court of arbitration in Lausanne, and consequently Michelle Smith was banned from competition for the rest of her life. Ironically, she is now a practising barrister – still with 3 gold medals on her top shelf.

- The Russian saga clandestine, state sanctioned drug abuse. There is no doubt that cheating was occurring at every level. This was brought to a pinnacle before the Rio Olympics in 2016.
- Never trust an Italian doctor named Ferrari ... Lance Armstrong had the edge on other athletes due
  to a cocktail of drugs prescribed by Ferrari. Armstrong has been described by colleagues as "an
  unethical, bullying con-man with no scruples ..."

Dave ended a fabulous presentation with the words of Willie Nelson, who said "It's terrible the way people have treated Lance, because when I was on drugs, I couldn't even find my bike ..."



Paul Jenner offered the thought for the week: "If it's going to be, it's up to me."
