Meeting Report 3rd February Rotary 3rd February 2020

President Bill welcomed our visitors - Ben Oge and Anna Irvine.

Trevor Mosley gave advance warning of subs being sent out shortly, get ready to pay thanks everyone.

Bruce Murdoch updated us about Barry Stafford who is now at home and mobile, doing physio and walking, even up Orakei Road. Go for it Barry, look forward to seeing you soon!

Noel Carey advised that work continues on the bait stations to keep the Kokako as safe as possible from predators.

The rat count was still reasonably high in December, so this work continues. Everyone is hoping that chick numbers are sufficient, so that there are lots of birds to relocate.

Five-minute speaker Trevor Mosley - getting the mail through in Beethoven's time

In a few weeks Bev and Trevor are travelling to Vienna for the 250th anniversary of Ludwig van Beethoven.

In 1806, George Thomson contacted Beethoven and asked him to arrange 23 sets of Scottish folk songs, as was a reasonably common request of composers in those times. Beethoven repeatedly tried to get the words to these songs from Thomson and is known to have sent these requests via at least three different routes to Edinburgh. Finally, six years after the original approach, Beethoven got the material he had requested.

On completion of the assignments, Thomson declared the works "original and beautiful" but that they would require "simplification for performance". Beethoven made it clear that he would not deign to simplify the works. Thomson wisely accepted this. Beethoven then went on to develop the original 23 pieces into 53.

Guest speaker Anna Irvine spoke about child cancer



Anna is the Northern Region Development Officer for the Child Cancer Foundation. For more than 40 years, the Foundation has supported children aged 0-12 years who have cancer, together with their families, until the child is 20 years of age. At least 3 new referrals are received every week. Sadly, this number has not changed, but wonderfully, the outcomes have.

Foundation offices throughout New Zealand have 19 family support workers who go to families' homes so that they can be sure of the best way to support the child. Children are referred by social workers in hospitals. Children can only be treated in Auckland or Christchurch hospitals. Every child who goes to hospital gets a personal handmade quilt, and for every procedure that a child undertakes, they receive a bead of courage. A child under 12 who is having treatment needs to have a family member with them 24/7 while in hospital - this creates enormous pressure on families.

The Foundation has two holiday homes, one in Taupo and one in Queenstown. They run camps for siblings, they have Christmas parties for families, and they offer personal development grants to help family members through changes needed through or after the care of a child with cancer.

CE Robyn Kiddle is amazing and has ensured ongoing funding. Nevertheless, with no government funding, and needing \$6 million each year to operate, the Child Cancer Foundation relies on its annual appeal to raise funds.

This year, the appeal is 28 and 29 February, and our Club will be assisting.

The impact of the Child Cancer Foundation was beautifully represented in a video featuring a young leukaemia sufferer, Ethan, and his family. Ethan's prognosis is good. He still has treatment to go, is on track and will continue to be supported by the Child Cancer Foundation. Ethan's Dad said "Thank you from here to the moon and back" to the Child Cancer Foundation.



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Far North Project update and thank you.

Dear Rotary team,

We are pleased to provide a six-month update on our Far North project and would like to thank you for your very generous contribution towards the establishment of Te Whakaora Tangata programmes in The Far North. This support will enable us to empower vulnerable families in the area who are desperately in need of a better future – families overwhelmed by poverty, violence, sexual abuse, drugs and crime.

John and Jacey Horan moved their family down to South Auckland for 6 months to train at our offices and learn first-hand how to create long-sustainable change amongst high-risk families in a community. They spent time training with our front-line staff engaging with clients both in their homes, and at our programmes. They also spent time with our operational staff learning the systems and processes required to successfully run our programmes.

John and Jacey moved back to the North in December and have since been joined by Cliffy and Indranee Reddy (Te Whakaora Founders) to set up operations. We have been welcomed into the building of He Korowai Trust with whom we are sharing office space. This organisation provides practical resources to families around housing, budgeting and advocacy, and is already proving to be a valuable partnership as we journey ahead to support the highest-risk families in the community.

We have set up our offices and opened our doors on, 13th January 2020, and have already been inundated with families seeking help. We knew that there was a great need in the community but were overwhelmed by the level of desperation from local families facing serious brokenness and dysfunction. Within the first week, we had six client sessions, and restored one family unit by working with each family member, then running a group family session. We have also facilitated and an abbreviated Family Restoration Course to the staff of He Korowai Trust so that they could gain a greater understanding of our programmes and our process, in order to facilitate deep partnership which will allow our services to complement each other. We have already had feedback form their staff about how our programmes might be the missing link in creating long term sustainable change in that community as we address the deep-rooted issues of trauma, which is necessary for the practical support to be effective and to break the cycle of dysfunction.

We have also met with many agencies in the local area to discuss partnership and client referral opportunities and processes, including the Department of Corrections and Oranga Tamariki. We are continuing to meet with other agencies and organisations to build a valuable network of referrers.

We are deeply excited to be breaking ground in the area and can't wait to see the hope and change we can bring to this part of the country thanks to your commitment and support of this work.



On **Friday 20 March** Waterlea School PTA is holding our biennial 'Waterlea Festival' - our biggest fundraiser of the year (see attached poster).

The festival is highly anticipated by our Waterlea whanau and the surrounding community including Onehunga. We're putting on games and activities, entertainment and food, all on our large school field. We can't wait!

Through this event, along with our other fundraising activities this year, we aim to raise enough to build a new junior playground which will serve not only our school but our local community.

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Presidents notice

Dear Rotary President,

Trees for Survival has been through one of those horror years that fortunately do not happen very often. In November 2018 we lost our National Manager to a sudden illness that lead to his resignation, in June we heard that our Chair had a cancer problem and he resigned as Chair, and in November 2019 our new National Manager found to his horror that he had cancer and resigned. As Trustees we felt very strongly for these three good people.

The idea for Trees for Survival began some 30 years ago and we were incorporated in 1994 so we have proven ourselves a **Rotary project** that has offered something new to our communities.

Last week we approached several people in the environmental service area, including our Patron Ruud Kleinpaste, and they told us that we are unique. Several organisations do some of the things we do but no one else takes children through the hands-on experience of potting trees at their school, nurturing them and then planting them out on threatened land.

We have decided that this is an appropriate time to think again about our model and believe that it is time to revert to our strengths as a volunteer organisation. Our experience is that committed volunteers achieve more than paid staff and that we have many Rotarians who are prepared to take on Field Officer roles as one example. We are receiving a stream of applications from schools to join the programme but are only prepared to take them on board if we can service them and we would like to **approach local Rotary clubs** to see if they have a **volunteer** who would put in the few hours a year in working with children in their schools. It has the advantage of not being very demanding physically so gives older Rotarians a chance to serve.

We have asked District Governors at intervals if they will permit us to approach clubs and that is the purpose of this message. The contacts from **Trees for Survival** will be Past District Governor Noel Holyoake or me.

The Rotary Centennial project, Trees, Trees, Trees, is also inspiring us to make this a strong growth year for Trees for Survival so could you please give us your support. Last year we planted over 90 000 native trees, but the potential is so much higher.
