It is with great sadness that we wish to advise that the Rotary District 9910 Annual Conference which was planned for 8-10 April 2022 in Tauranga has been cancelled due to COVID.

Based on the Government's decision to put the whole country into the red traffic light setting (under code "red" public events are limited to a maximum of 100 persons) along with current COVID modelling suggesting that the major Omicron outbreak will occur at the end of March, our Conference team have been left with no option but to cancel.

The Government has indicated that the country will remain in red for many weeks so we cannot continue to plan for the Conference. The health and safety of our amazing Rotarian members along with the organising committee and wonderful guest speakers is paramount.

This is a huge blow for all those people who have worked so hard to pull this event together, and we thank all of you for your time and energy in trying to create this event.

5-minute Speaker Bruce Murdoch

Bruce shared with the members his past yachting experiences during a trip back to Auckland from Bay of Islands.

It was 20 years ago; Dick and I had spent a couple of weeks sailing in the Bay of Islands. No dramas, apart from nearly being run down by a non-piloted gin palace. But that's another story.

Set out from Okiato(Opua) to return to Auckland and beat our Way out of the Bay into an 8 knot Nor'easter. Cleared the Hole in the Rock, set the spinnaker and ran down the coast to Whangamumu Harbour where we planned to spend the night and catch up with friends ashore. Which

we did by rowing ashore and securing the dinghy, which remained ashore secured (unlike Bill Grayson's recent experience!).

The following day, with the light Nor'easter, we continued down to Tutukaka Harbour, made famous recently by the tsunami surge. Anchored overnight with 5 metres of chain down and plenty of warp to counter the tide. Sill no dramas, until the early morning when the tide whistled in from the sou'west.

The tail of cyclone Betsy had arrived. Not weather to go sailing!

Spent that day sailing around the anchor under bare mast, driven by a 50 knot wind coming from all directions down the valleys. Sailed nearly a mile that day and didn't go anywhere.

The following morning the wind had abated somewhat, so we set out under reefed



main and furled genoa for Kawau. Beating across Bream Bay, around Cape Rodney and into Kawau, the wind was about 30 knots – a wild ride, shipping the waves green across the bow. Oh, and ham sandwiches are not the best doused by such a wave. Cell phones do not appreciate slopping around in the bilge!

Coming into Mansion House Bay was like turning of the fan, calm and peaceful.

The rum and cokes were welcome that evening!

The next day the wind had dropped further, but still an interesting ride ac cross to Whangapararoa and into gulf Harbour.
