
CLUB ANNOUCEMENTS

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Rotary Book Fair on 26th and 27th November

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Judy Lawley (ADG): Polio and All That



Most of our members can remember polio vaccinations and will know of someone who had polio. To raise money for the long running Rotary International Programme to eradicate polio around the world we are hosting, with the Westhaven Rotary Club, a showing of a new film, **"The Lost King" at 3:30pm at the Westgate Event Centre, Westgate on Sunday December 4, 2022.**

The timing is picked so that you have an entertaining and feel-good experience before the final intense commercial phases of the Christmas we all know, kicks in.

This is a comedy drama about the search for and finding of the body of Richard III, the King reputed to have said "My kingdom for a horse!" The team, which was involved with the 2013 film "Philomena", is also responsible for this film. Philomena starred Judi Dench as Philomena Lee who spent 50 years searching for her lost son. That film won many plaudits and was film at its best. The Lost King promises the same outcome.

Judy Lawley, Rotary District Assistant Governor, Area 7, District 9910 and a member of Westhaven Rotary was our guest speaker.

She was introduced by Bede Brittenden with the touching connection that they both had polio in their early years. We who know Bede, are aware that he never let that early challenge get in his way. Bede carved out a successful career in sport, business, in family life and in some of the Catholic institutions of NZ.

Judy comes with the same determination shown by Bede. Her career was in education, social services, and local government. In 1997 she was awarded a **Rotary Peace Studies Scholarship to Oxford University**. This was one of fifty given around the world. During that time, she was part of a **Convoy of Hope** which visited Vukovar, the Croatian town which suffered much destruction and death in the bitter strife which occurred in the Balkan peninsula in the 1990s. Judy can vividly recall how an older woman she met there, was asking why all the young people who had lived had died.

Judy can see some parallels with some of what is now happening in Ukraine

The broad background to Judy's address is as follows. Infantile Paralysis (poliomyelitis) epidemics broke out in New Zealand in: 1916, 1925, 1927, 1937, 1948–49, 1952–53 and 1955–56. Until the arrival of effective vaccines in the late 1950s, polio was a devastating virus as it particularly affected children, says Polio NZ Board member, Sue Griffin.

"During the global polio pandemics New Zealand alone recorded around 10,000 cases, and more than 800 deaths," says Griffin. "Survivors often suffered from lifelong partial or complete paralysis of limbs or the entire body. In the worst cases, the lives of seriously paralysed patients could only be saved by long periods in a compression chamber or 'iron lung'."

Judy showed us moving photos of the callipers and shoes she had to wear to help her to walk in the early 1950s.

The essential facts about polio are these:

- It is a viral infection which causes nerve injury.
- 0.5% of those infected, experience muscle weakness/permanent paralysis.
- There is no treatment so that prevention is the key, hence vaccination.
- It spreads through faecal matter, contaminated water or saliva.
- The Salk vaccine arrived in NZ in 1956.

In more recent years a condition known as Post-polio Syndrome (PPS") has emerged amongst those who had polio. This presents with a progression of symptoms:

- A decline in muscular function.
- Less endurance of effort.
- An intolerance of cold.
- Breathing difficulties and dysphagia (swallowing difficulties).
- Pain.
- Severe fatigue

Judy's guesstimate is that there about 3,000 people in NZ who have had polio in their early life. **Polio New Zealand** exists to support them. Judy explained that PPS came about because originally when polio was contracted, the nerve cells of the body were invaded. This led to a lack of nerve supply to the muscles. The surviving muscles tried to make up the deficiency and grew "sprouts". These sprouts gradually degenerate partly from over exercise. This leads to loss of function and new weakness. The counter to this is moderate and careful exercise.

In moving a vote of thanks for Judy, immediate past president Robin Hulford noted the importance of immunisation to counter the virus and that Judy had illustrated there was more depth to the consequences of having had it.
