
## **PRESIDENT'S ANNOUNCEMENTS**

(Brian Williams introduced our guest speakers. Heather joined the Laura Fergusson Trust (LFT) in 2008 and worked in various senior roles until becoming the CEO in 2013. She retired in 2020 and is now a Board member.

Shelley has a background in health institutions and joined the Trust in 2018 in a Senior Operating role becoming General Manager in 2020).

The Laura Fergusson Trust for Disabled Persons (Auckland) was established in 1967 by Lady Laura Fergusson (wife of Governor-General Sir Bernard Fergusson) and Lady Mary Caughey, to provide services for disabled persons.

The Auckland office of the Trust has recently announced a change of direction.

The Trust's website records the Trust's current position as follows: Our founders' vision was to assist and encourage disabled people towards achieving their full potential and independence in daily living. For over 50 years this vision was realised through many evolutions in society, policy, medical knowledge, the growing use of technology and increasing understanding of disability.

The way we look at disability in New Zealand has also changed significantly over this time.

New Zealand's disability sector is undergoing a once-in-a-generation shift, driven by new policy underpinned by the **UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (UNCRPD),** Te Tiriti o Waitangi and ensuring disabled people are involved in decision-making that impacts them.

To secure a strong financial future for the Trust, we must adapt to support disabled people in a way that reflects this sector transformation. This includes transforming LFT Auckland to a social investment agency model, **led by people with lived experience of disability.** 

We will continue to build on our founders' legacy through sustainable initiatives that remove barriers and create new opportunities for disabled people. Our vision is an equitable society for disabled New Zealanders.

Over 50 years ago the trust acquired 1.4 hectares of land in Great South Road, near the Market Road intersection. At that time disabled people were looked after in rest homes. The Trust built and provided modern self-contained accommodation for the disabled, as well as specialised training services and facilities on its own site. Its services were for the brain injured as well as those with physical challenges. The operating costs grew over the years and after a time it had less capital for future developments.

Over those years much changed in treatments, technology, and the basic philosophy in how disabled persons were cared for. Most important was that **disabled people were the best source for establishing the needs required.** 

This year the Government has set up Whaikaha, a new Ministry of Disabled People. The LFT has adapted to align its future with the Ministry.
