RICHARD RYAN

Chateau Tongariro Hotel

Richard has been associated with the Chateau, nestled below Mt Ruapehu, for a very long time.

Born in Taihape, Richard, in his early 20's, used go up the mountains a lot. He remembered the roads were appalling but that's what you did when there was not much else. Taihape would get pretty frosty that left toilets frozen along with the milk at the gate.

The Chateau is a Historic Place - Category 1 and built to

encourage tourism in NZ and managed by the Tourist Hotel Corporation (THC) 1957-1990. A Malaysian-based consortium then leased the building for a 30-yr term which expired in April 2020. Thereafter it was leased month-by-month and finally closed on 5th Feb 2023 and handed back to the Dept of Conservation due to seismic risks.

In earlier days it was a magnificent building that was well frequented, formal, tourist destination. As a young Jaycee, Richard once visited the Chateau for a 3-day conference. He remembered it was just sleet and snow outside so everyone just stayed inside quite comfortably. At the end however they found their cars were snowed and had to be dug out.

(Jaycees (Junior Chamber of Commerce), Intl service organisation like Lions & Rotary, est NZ 1944-1984, age restricted to 18-40yr old men - Ed)

Whilst being built to serve the nearby Whakapapa ski field, Richard imagined people also visited it because of its scenic remoteness, beauty, peace and quiet.

Taihape is 90-mins away and Richard remembers there used to be some pretty good New Year's parties up there. Everyone was expected to be formally dressed and would sip cocktails with the Chateau Manager. There was also a longtime pianist who would play there 5-6 days a week. People would visit the place for generations. Richard's last visit the Chateau in Nov 2022 and noted it had deteriorated quite a bit.

Commissioned on 1 Aug 1929, the Chateau is now 94-years old - it would have been nice to see it get to 100.





HENI GOLDSMITH

The Shamed Life of a Maori Girl

Phil A introduced Heni and has known her for 68-years and whose son is Phil's son-in-law. Heni is a very gracious, quietly spoken woman and one who shows the confidence of having overcome early prejudices and gone on to follow her dreams as a teacher.

Heni's life has not been easy.

Heni, now 91-yrs, was born in Gisborne. Her father's descendants 'jumped ship' and her Grandfather set up a sheep shearing gang there. The whole family was involved including Uncles, Aunties were fleecers, and Heni's father was a

shepherd. Heni was the first and only child. Her Mother died early and her father later remarried. At 5-yrs Heni would ride the draft horses and pick up the food and drop it off along the way. The Missionaries would teach the children on the grass and at age 7-8 the Heni and other kids would go to school. The Māori kids were gathered up onto a bus and were told not to speak or sing in Māori. They used to look across at the pakeha kids who all had shoes and were ashamed and stayed silent because they knew very little English weren't allowed to talk to each other in Māori. They never told their parents.

The way Heni and her friends were taught at school foreign to them Māori live and learn together – not as individuals. She remembered having kerosine poured on their heads to kill the nits. She also remembered how white people couldn't speak Māori very well and at times make fun of them mispronouncing tēnā koutou as tina-cocoa.

In the 6th Form Heni was asked what she would like to do and she said "to be a teacher", but was told she was not bright enough. It was suggested she do Commercial Practice instead – but Heni did not like that. Heni met a girl from Motiti Island who sat and taught her the Bible and Heni became a Christian at the age of 16-yrs. Determined, Heni studied for 4-years to finally get her School Certificate and was the only Māori to gain it that year. Heni worked as a Teachers Aid and applied for Teachers College but didn't get in. Her Uncle had connections and managed to get Heni enrolled at Auckland Teachers College and after gaining her qualification returned to Wairoa and taught there for 10-years.

Heni was married but her husband passed away early. She worked in Fiji but due to health problems had to return home. She remarried, had two boys and a girl but later separated and brought the kids up herself, working all over Auckland as a





Teacher. After the kids left home Heni read a magazine advertising for Teachers to work abroad as a relief Teacher working 3-6-month stints. She signed up and the job took her to 73-countires including: Korea, China, Guatemala and India to name a few. She found she always got along very well with the kids who often saw her as a local. In 1996 Heni was invited to work in the Olympic Village at the Atlanta Games along with other Christian teachers and remembers the common connection resulted in them getting along all very well.

At the end of the talk, Trevor Mosley (Ngati Maniopoto/Ngai Maru) thanked Heni in Māori and reflected on how she had identified and overcame the issues at an early age and how she backed herself when others said she wasn't capable and that along with her faith got to where she is today. What a great example to others.
