

#### JEANETTE THORNE Community Update



**Jeanette Thorne** spoke eloquently of her "**dream to feed the people of Oranga**" - to have community fruit/veggie gardens which people in local communities maintained, nurtured, and fed from.

The first community garden planted was in **Ferguson Park**, but unfortunately the young plants were accidently mown down.

Jeanette's next attempt was to develop a **Oranga Kai Ora Community Garden** at 63 Oranga Avenue. In her capacity as Onehunga District Community Organiser of Social Services (**ODCOSS**) she is applying for funding to have the Ferguson Park Community Garden reinstated.

Jeanette is clearly a busy lady and spoke of loneliness amongst older people and the need to have regular social gatherings for them. She is organising a function for Seniors on 4<sup>th</sup> May with a guest speaker.

Finally, Jeanette said as President-elect of our Club one of her aspirations when she takes over the mantle of presidency is to **get younger people into our club.** 







**SEAN MARSTON** 

Notes from Napal

Guest speaker Sean Marston was introduced by Craig Jones.

**Sean** lives in Titirangi, is married, and has a son in Rotary in Queen St, Auckland.

Sean has worked in aid and development in Africa and Asia for the past 25years. In the 1980's he **assisted set up a leprosy hospital in Nepal** along with a number of other Europeans. The hospital is now run by Nepali for Nepal people and has grown to three hospitals (400 staff) of which two are devoted to leprosy care. Leprosy in Nepal is a major disease and according to Sean affected people are still considered outcasts in the community.

The 2<sup>nd</sup> major cause of hospitalisation in Nepal is injury from falling out of trees as a result of people looking for firewood. Given the mountainous topography of most of Nepal some 26 million or 87% of the population live in mountains making access very difficult. Earthquakes are a major problem. Sean said our late Sir Edmund Hillary is still revered in Nepal for his work building schools and hospitals.

Sean works for the **International Nepal Fellowship (INF)**, a Christian based organisation where he recruits people with specialist medical skills and experience. He showed us several videos of life in Nepal and the work of INF whose goals are to transform, empower, renew, construct, enable and essentially "bring life in all its fullness to the people of Nepal."

Most Nepalese are traditionally bound by the caste system which although officially unconstitutional is still widely practised and discriminates against lower castes, for example the Dalit caste and women in particular.

Sean stated much of the work of the INF in the past 20 years has been educating people to accept change, the premise being that education creates self-help. The organisation gets disadvantaged groups together to work out how they can help themselves using existing resources. Solving their own problems is a key goal. Women are considered in Sean's words "to be the lowest of low".

Sean stated their efforts are paying off with children now attending school and many new startup businesses commencing. This is raising self-esteem and giving people a voice. INF estimate 1,000 self-help groups are demonstrating the power to break poverty. Good housing is another goal of INF who last November helped 20 families rebuild homes that had been destroyed by earthquake.

Sean felt NZers nowadays exhibit a lessening sense of responsibility to the world compared to the 'old days' - probably brought about by an ongoing bombardment of media stories on world poverty. He believes many people now "feel disconnected", and that our world view has "reduced to 1-metre." Unless it directly impacts us individually, we quickly become disconnected from the realities of world issues.

Members had follow-up questions around leprosy (now curable) and the caste system.

Sean finished by saying he believes "change in Nepal has to be bottom up with the help of resources from other countries".

Sean thanked Members who donated foreign currency together with the swag of foreign currency coins accumulated in the Sargeant's Fund. These will be sold on Trade Me and used to assist the INF.

**Bill G** thanked Sean for his most interesting address and quoted statistics on the incidence of leprosy which is reducing globally and the relationship it has with poverty.
