COLIN TEA Elephants by the ton 5-r



Colin Tea's topic of choice was elephants, but as an aside he preceded it by saying he recommends the wearing of Hip Protectors for anyone who is feeling a little unsteady.

Back to the elephants, Colin and wife Hazel lived and worked in South Africa for many years and took the opportunity to go on a safari to a Lodge at Kasaba Bay, on the shores of Lake Tanganyika, Zambia in central eastern Africa. Colin described Lake Tanganyika as very long and narrow, approximately 700km averaging 50km in width.

They flew in but had to wait for the dust to settle on the runaway before alighting from their plane, the effects of successive years of harsh droughts.



The resort had all the mod/cons and was

very comfortable. On arrival they were welcomed by a lady with bananas who called out to the nearby elephants (who are very partial to bananas) who came readily at her call.

Colin shared some info about elephants e.g. they apparently have a variety of temperaments, and walk a very narrow track due to their lumbering gait.

He illustrated their huge strength by sharing an anecdote on how elephants broke into an iron bar reinforced food store using their tusks and body weight where they partook of a feed of yeast. The result...no bread.

On another occasion he went for a shower only to find the shower room very dark due to an elephant leaning against the shower bock window totally obliterating all daylight.

The elephants influence extended to the nearby beach which was unswimmable because of their presence. This meant he and Hazel had to travel to another beach only to find there were hippos resident 150m offshore. Their guides had to fire gunshots to frighten them off before they could swim. Another obstacle was a huge black snake on the path which was given a wide berth.

Apart from all that Colin said they had a very pleasant holiday. Good one Colin, most interesting!





Our guest Speaker **Christopher Theunissen** was introduced by Rob Lyons. Chris is the **Branch Manager for Citizens Advice Bureau (CAB) at Onehunga**, which is one of 32 Bureaus in Auckland. Chris originated from South Africa.

Chris introduced his subject by saying there has been some misunderstanding in recent times about the funding and functions of the CAB. Media had made them the subject of discussion following comments from Auckland Council on possible funding cuts.

Chris stated their role was to help and assist the public by giving advice and empowering people to solve their own issues. They also act as advocates when necessary. For example, CAB approached Government last year regarding Government Department requirements for on-line document processing rather than paper applications. As Chris said not everybody has access to computers.

Regarding funding Auckland Council are currently looking at their budget and are considering reducing the annual \$2m grant to CAB (spread across 32

Bureaus) in the belief they should be funded by Central Government. The Government of course believe it is the responsibility of local government to fund CAB. As Chris said, "when elephants fight the grass gets trampled". But as Chris noted CAB has been in existence for 50-years and it's critical we retain our funding without which we could not operate as we do currently. He believes neither local or central government want to see us close as we assist many people with local and central government issues and problems. The CAB has access to a huge database which is maintained by the CABNZ National Office, Wellington.

Chris was questioned on the \$ value of CAB services and replied saying a recent report quantified the \$ value of their services as "for every \$1 spent the community receives \$13.20 back in value". While reluctant to get into the specifics of overhead costs it is sufficient to say the collective cost of running the 32-bureaus was under \$1m p.a.

As a Charity with public funding (plus some minor corporate funding), CAB is required to comply with the rules and provisions of the Charities Act and publish annual reports which are available to the public.

Questioned on the numbers of people helped annually, Chris said every client interaction was logged and peer reviewed. Whilst he didn't have figures for the Onehunga CAB, he did say 1,000's of people were assisted each month. A recent public petition attracted 20,000 signatures to retain the services of the CAB.

In answer to questions about local costs Chris said he was the only paid worker at CAB Onehunga and worked part time. However, Chris manages 45-volunteers working at the Bureau including specialist services such as Justices of the Peace and financial budgeting.

Chris ended by saying the CAB was not a political front for Government. They are independent and impartial and beholden to no-one. CAB is reluctant to seek corporate sponsorship as they wish to retain their independence.

Colin Tea thanked Chris for his most interesting address commended him for the excellent work at the CAB.
