President Jeanette has had a varied range of jobs in health, education and general management and leadership across the public and private sectors.

Jeanette went to Epsom Grammer and then became a physio working mainly in elderly health. She was the business manager of the Onehunga Emergency Clinic, CEO of a company that matched nurses to employers, an Air New Zealand reservation consultant, member of the Auckland Grammer Rowing Club, Physio again and obtained an MBA in Sustainability. She undertook a Primary Teaching degree but was eventually put off by having to teach multiple, violent 6 year olds. She then spent time with her family and then became a Green Party campaigner.

More recently Jeanette organised the launch of the Oranga Community Garden and latterly has been a member of the Onehunga District Community Organiser of Social Services (ODCOSS).

Learning about our new President was coincidently in keeping with what we were about to hear from the 2023-24 RI President, Gordon R. McInally regarding encouraging more women to be involved in leadership and unlocking their potential.

Fittingly before our club dinner and in honour of the new RI President, grace was given in Scots by Past-Club Secretary and Scotsman, Iain McCrea who recited Robbie Burn's Selkirk Grace (also known as the Galloway or Covenanters' Grace).

lain McCrea introduced the <u>video</u> (CTRL click to play) with a precis of Gordon McInally.


Gordon was born in Portobello, Edinburgh, in 1955. He is married to Heather and has two daughters. Gordon's father worked for a manufacturer of Glenmorangie whisky and his mother ran a private nursery. Gordon practised dentistry for 30 years before retiring with Heather on the borders of Scotland. Gordon joined Rotary at the age of 26yrs after being persuaded by a farmer friend at his church. He is a passionate follower of rugby. Both he and Heather love haggis and have been known to pick it up on their travels and microwave it in their hotel room.

RI President Gordon's hope and call to action for the world is reflected by the 18th-century poet, Robbie Burns who spoke of all the world becoming kin, promoting "sense and worth, over all the earth."



Key takeaways from Gordon's address were:

- To "Create Hope in the World" through our actions.
- Unlocking the potential in women and girls.
- Elevating the status of young people, empowering Rotaractors with Global Grants.
- Taking a strong stand and support of diversity, equity and inclusion and to expand a sense of belonging.
- Polio remains Rotary's top corporate priority and to raise \$50m USD each year.
- Use the full potential of Rotary to promote peace through International exchange.
- Ask each other "How are you, really?" to strengthen our friendships through acts of kindness.
- That Mental Health care fits well within Rotary's Areas of Focus. Gordon cited the work that District 9910 and Cat Levin are doing in New Zealand and others are doing in areas around the world. It is Rotary's aim to prioritise this in 2023-24 and in the years ahead.
