ROB LYONS Lessons from Canada



When Rob spoke to us back in October 2021, we learnt a bit about his 1970's OE in Canada. While there, he casually mentioned being employed as an electrical engineer in an Ontario Nuclear power station. Tonight, we learnt a bit more.

NZ in the mid-1960's was rapidly developing and needed more power. At the tender age of 22yrs Rob started as an apprentice electrician with the NZED. There, Rob and others were tasked to undertake a scoping study to build a Nuclear Power plant in Kaipara Harbour. As it turned out, not surprisingly, no one in the team knew anything about nuclear power plants, so not much happened in the following 6-months. (*The site investigation work at Kaipara was closed down in 1971, and New Zealand remained nuclear-free – Ed*).

Rob and wife Marney then decided to live in Canada and so left for Vancouver. Rob upskilled with further electrical engineering studies, earning money working as a tech at the Vancouver General Hospital. 12 months later he passed his exams with honours.

Rob applied for and secured a job in Ontario, 2,600km to the east, which would require travel in the Canadian winter. While obviously a bright chap, the smart Kiwi was about to learn what Canadian winter travel was really about, and the two set off:

- Broke down along the way in his new Toyota due to a strange clunking sound from the wheels. (*Lesson 1: Unbeknownst to Rob, he had driven through black ice in -32deg C temperatures and the tires had frozen).*
- While getting help from a local Alberta mechanic, Rob was asked, "Where are your frost plugs?" "What are they?". (*Lesson 2:* Frost plugs are small heaters screwed into the engine block and submerged into the coolant to keep it from freezing and the oil in other areas from thickening. This results in faster/easier start-ups).
- A bit further along, every few kilometers the car would just stop. Enquiring at another garage, Rob was asked," Are you using anti-freeze in your fuel?" "No." (*Lesson 3: Petrol freezes at -40°C to -50°C. Ethanol is an effective anti-freeze and is regularly added to fuel there*).
- Next stop was at the Royal Mint in Sudbury which was located at the top of a steep hill. Parking at the bottom they ran to the top where locals looked at them in surprise. (Lesson 4: Little did they know that heavy breathing in freezing temperatures can be quite hazardous. Luckily no one had asthma or COPD).

• Finally, upon reaching Ontario the two moved into company-provided accommodation. Rob went to park his new car in the garage and was told "You don't want to be doing that". (*Lesson 5: Any car parked in a garage would rust out in one year due to road salt. Instead, Rob was advised to park it out in the freezing weather where it would last at least 3 years).*

Rob became Commissioning Engineer at the new 750MW Bruce Nuclear Generating Station on the shore of Lake Huron Ontario and was tasked to fully test it before handing it over to the Running Committee. *(Benmore, NZ has 850MW output - Ed)*

After that Rob next went on to train the operational staff at another Nuclear Power station. By that time Marney was pregnant and her Mum thought they'd been away quite long enough so flew over to bring them all back to NZ.
