





President Jeanette welcomed everyone and introduced visitor lan Calhaem.

In lieu of last week's meeting was the Movie event set up by **Gary Hays** at the Lido which was a great success.

Tonight, in lieu of a Guest Speaker will be our Club Forum, led by **Vice-President Barry Stafford**.

Gary gave a report on the Lido Movie event which was a great success. Eighty tickets were sold from which \$450 will go toward funding Club projects.

What a great theatre the Lido is too with big thanks to the management and staff for making us feel very welcome.

It was good to see a wide variety of people who bought tickets to come on a cool Monday night. There were 50-60 guests, young and old, which just shows how effective an idea it is exposing Rotary to the wider community.

For this, the theatre was just the right size to make it comfortably full and made all the better with an excellent bar for pre-movie mingling, and drinks that can be taken into the auditorium. The seats were wide and comfortable with plenty of passing space to get to your seat.





After a greeting and thank you by President Jeanette the lights dimmed, and we launched straight into The Miracle Club movie without any preceding ads. Each of these small things added to make the evening feel special.

Gary suggested we make this an annual event to which members showed their agreement with applause.







Our visitor tonight was Ian Calhaem, a geophysicist and Forensic Scientist, specialising in 3D reconstruction to determine trauma forces and in video analysis, and "who is highly regarded for his knack of finding elegant solutions to difficult technical problems".

An area lan is currently involved in is the manufacture and application of a highly effective yet remarkably safe

'disinfectant' that kills most pathogens and that can be used in a wide range of applications. The fluid is safe, FDA approved and when used at a concentration of 60ppm, is applied as a no-rinse sanitiser to all meat types, fruits and vegetables. It is also proposed the disinfectant could be a safer and more cost effective alternative to the use of chlorine public pools and water supplies. Further uses could be in wound cleaning and fogging of operating theatres, pre-surgery. The healing properties are impressive when used on wounds and has been found to be inert enough to be used to sterilise petri dishes while not impacting the growth of stem cells.

The liquid can be made incredibly cost effectively due to its mode of manufacture and would be very easy to install small solar powered regenerating units in remote villages for water sterilisation and disinfecting clinics. Trials are currently underway in New Zealand.
