KATARINA BURGESS Ukraine-Russia Conflict - Why It's Personal

Our Guest Speaker **Katarina Burgess** was introduced by **Bill Grayson** who reminded us Katarina manned a food stall at last year's Rotary Book Fair selling

Ukrainian delicacies to raise funds toward the Ukrainian war conflict.

Katarina informed us she was born in <u>Kyrgyzstan</u>, a small landlocked republic in the Soviet Union where she received her education. Her upbringing was very strict, and she was expected to comply with the rigid Soviet schooling system. She described her childhood as basic, dull and without choices. They made all their own clothing. They couldn't openly criticise anything and although a sub- culture of protest existed, it wasn't open. Her grandparents were Ukrainian.

She described Kyrgyzstan was one of 15 Soviet republics, very small, mountainous and one of the least crowded countries in the world with one of the smallest railway networks. It was on the route of the 'Silk Road' and had three UNESCO World Heritage sites. Although there was no religion in her childhood (*90% Muslim (majority Sunni*), *7% Christian*), she described Kyrgyzstans as being very hospitable and

friendly people who reached out to anyone in need and accorded a great deal of respect to their elders. She also lived and worked in Ukraine for six years.

Katarina studied medicine and graduated around the time the USSR collapsed (1989-1992). After graduation she worked as a doctor where her remuneration was a paltry USD25 per month. She said they frequently ran out of medical supplies which forced families of patients to provide their own medicines. Bribes and corruption were rife. She came to the realisation she didn't want to be part of this system and after a couple of years decided she had to get out of the Soviet Union. Accordingly, she decided her exit strategy was to marry someone outside Russia. She searched the globe settling on NZ where she met her future husband online. She persuaded him to come to Europe where in his words "he travelled halfway around the world to get a date, then proposed and married her." This was the start of a new life for her in NZ where she has lived for the past 24-years raising three 'beautiful' children.

Katarina is involved in Russian/NZ Christian fellowship where she is active in counselling children. She is also a member of the <u>Zonta NZ</u> (*a global organisation that works to advance the rights and status of women worldwide*).

She then went on to talk about Ukraine and the vast scale of humanitarian needs resulting from the current conflict with Russia. Some alarming statistics given were; 40% of the population (14.5 million) require humanitarian aid; 4 million people including 1 million children are currently displaced; over 6.5 million have fled the Ukraine and live as refugees in neighbouring countries; the current conflict is causing havoc and is very stressful with death, destruction and the loss of many lives including children who have lost their parents.

Although she is Russian, Katarina said her sympathies lay with Ukraine. Many Russian people living in NZ were conflicted and are on different sides. Some of her friends were pro-Putin which she struggles to understand. According to her they feel depressed, conflicted and don't feel part of NZ...they were living in a bubble.

Katarina along with other pro-Ukraine volunteers decided she needed to get involved with <u>fundraising</u> to support vulnerable victims of the conflict and leads an organisation providing physiological help (*a type of professional help that involves talking with a trained therapist. It's also known as talking therapy or psychological treatment*) to Ukrainian soldiers and sending much needed medical equipment and supplies for Ukrainian hospitals. She described her group of volunteers and supporters as "amazing." To date they have raised over \$26,000 through cake stalls etc. In her words, "it may be small, but every dollar raised helps."

Katarina concluded her talk by saying "there is no justification for the invasion of another country."

Katarina was thanked by Rhett Stephens who urged Katarina to keep up the great work she and her colleagues were doing.
