Ann Dunphy bought greetings from the Rotary Club of Penrose and mentioned how deeply committed they are to youth programmes.

Barry and Bill recently visited their club to talk about their and lain's youth literacy work at the Pacific Advance Secondary School (PASS).

Ann applauded their contribution and believed, "the future of Rotary is in connection with youth."

Tony gave some insight to the operation of **Hato Hone St John** where he works in its National Operations Centre, Mt
Wellington.

Tony highlighted St John's emergency ambulance services that reach 90% of New Zealanders across 97% of the country. With a membership of 15,300 comprising of around 8,000 Volunteers, 4,200 paid staff and 6,000 Youth



members, St John managed an impressive 674,374 111 emergency calls during the 2022-2023 period.

Beyond emergency response, St John's involvement also includes attending public Events such as rugby games and concerts where the 4,079 events attended contributed to its revenue stream. Notably, services such as Medical Alarms and Patient Transfers are integral parts of their operations, with over 51,000 Medical Alarm alerts and 80,000 patient transfers recorded.

Funding primarily comes from Crown Funding, covering 82.4% of St John's emergency ambulance operations, supplemented by revenue generated through donations, events, memberships, and patient transfers. Despite an annual income of \$366



million in 2022-2023, St John faced an Emergency and Transport services deficit of \$29 million.

Performance metrics underscore St John's commitment to timely response, with 95.7% and 97% of Urban and Rural cardiac and respiratory arrests attended to within 12 and 25 minutes respectively. The various response types have specific Key

Performance Indicators (KPI) set by the Ministry of Health in conjunction with St John to ensure a level of service.

Furthermore, data analysis of changes noted between 2022 and 2023 reveals increases in call volumes (up 6.8%), traumatic injuries, stroke, mental health and heat/cold exposure and a decrease in breathing problems, sick person – specific diagnosis, choking and headaches.

Challenges such as traffic congestion during peak hours and resource allocation in rural areas remain focal points for improvement. Nonetheless, St John's steadfast dedication continues to ensure that communities receive vital medical care when needed.

This insight into St John's operations offers a glimpse into the organisation's significant contributions to public health and safety across the nation.
