Guest Speaker: Review of Anzac Day Memorial Service at Epsom

The recent Anzac Day service held at the Epsom Memorial Archway successfully honoured the sacrifices of those who served in wartime, as reflected in the heartfelt appreciation expressed by Louis and Mavis Fenlon.

In a letter of thanks, they praised the Rotary organizers, Barry and Peter, for maintaining the dignity and traditional style of the service. Despite their absence due to health issues, they were encouraged by the positive feedback from attendees, highlighting the emotional impact of the flowers gifted to them, which provided comfort during a challenging time.

The service itself was marked by meaningful contributions from various speakers, including the daughters of Mavis Fenlon, who emphasized the historical significance of the Anzac sacrifices. They shared poignant reflections on the dire conditions faced by soldiers and illustrated the importance of the annual remembrance, rooted in their family's legacy.
