Guest Speaker: George Arulanantham

George's presentation described a personal journey through the diagnosis and treatment of multiple myeloma, a type of cancer affecting the bone marrow. His condition was discovered through a routine blood test, which led to immediate medical attention and a series of consultations with specialists from a renowned cancer research centre.

Following thorough testing, a treatment plan involving chemotherapy and stem cell transplantation was devised, highlighting the importance of both the medical team's expertise and advanced treatment options.

The treatment process involved two phases: an initial 16 weeks of chemotherapy, where the speaker took numerous tablets daily, followed by a stem cell transplant. This complex procedure required the extraction of healthy stem cells from George's blood, which were preserved for later use after aggressive chemotherapy aimed at eradicating cancer cells.

Despite facing significant side effects, including severe diarrhoea and a brief ICU stay, George remained proactive, documenting his health status to facilitate communication with healthcare providers.

After undergoing a second transplant and regular monitoring, George experienced improved health and began maintenance treatment to prevent relapse.

In conclusion, George emphasized the importance of resilience and trust in modern medicine during his cancer journey. He encouraged others facing similar challenges to stay positive and believe in the capabilities of their healthcare team.

Additionally, George shared his desire to contribute to medical knowledge through body donation and literary endeavours, underscoring a commitment to leaving a legacy even amid personal trials. George's presentation serves as an inspiring testament to the strength and hope found in the face of serious illness.

George was thanked by Rhett Stephens for sharing his journey with us and his message of remaining positive and Trusting in modern medicine.


Maungakiekie Rotary - State of the Nation Fundraiser




