### **Guest speaker Noel Carey**



Noel used a comprehensive slide show to share with us the Middle East trip that he did with Jenny.

In late February, a group comprising 19 individuals, primarily over 60, embarked on a trip from Auckland to Dubai and then to Egypt. The demographic included a significant number of single women, with just two single men present, alongside three couples. Initial apprehensions about the journey soon dissipated as they united in the adventure.

The flight to Dubai lasted around 17 hours, arriving early morning. Dubai boasts a population of approximately 4.5 million, while Egypt's populace stands at about 116 million, with most concentrated in a small area. The group embarked on a bus tour of Dubai's landmarks, including the Burj Khalifa, the tallest building in the world at 828 meters. The observation deck provided a breath-taking view, and the rapid elevators contributed to Dubai's impressive number of world records, second only to a fast lift in Shanghai.

A visit to the Museum of the Future showcased various world records, such as the most expensive diamond-encrusted guitar and the largest gold ring weighing 60 kilograms. Dubai Airport ranks as the second busiest globally, expected to expand significantly by 2032, surpassing passenger handling capabilities of major airports, including Auckland's.

The group then transitioned from the modern marvels of Dubai to traditional experiences via an Abra boat in the older parts of Dubai before flying to Alexandria, Egypt. Upon arrival, an incident occurred when binoculars packed for travel were confiscated, as bringing them into Egypt is prohibited. Following this, they travelled by bus to Cairo, moving onward to Luxor where they embarked on a Nile cruise.

The antiquity and sheer size of the many places visited were the most impressive memories of the tour of this region.

The itinerary was slightly altered due to the unavailability of Jordan, leading to two

additional days in Egypt. Notable sites visited included Roman ruins in Alexandria, where the Roman amphitheatre and ancient catacombs were explored. Here, artifacts like gold coins recovered from the sea hinted at historical events affecting the region.

The group journeyed west to El Alamein, a poignant site honouring the sacrifices of over 7,000 Kiwis buried there from World War II, marking their legacy in a significant cemetery. The accompanying museum offered insight into the era, displaying relics and memorabilia from the conflict. The experience was sobering, as many of the fallen were very young, a stark reminder of the cost of war.

Overall, the trip combined modern wonders with rich historical exploration, fostering connections among participants while providing deep cultural insights into both Dubai and Egypt.

Noel was thanked by Craig Jones for sharing their interesting trip with the members.
